#### **Course Outcomes**

This course is a survey of the political, social, and cultural history of the ancient world. Upon completion of the course, students will have learned to analyze primary source documents; interrogate historical representations of gender, class, and society; and explain key concepts, events, and people in World History. This course may count as a social science or humanities credit, but not both, at Bellevue College.

#### **How Outcomes Will Be Met**

Course outcomes will be met through the following assessments: five (5) class discussion assignments (75 points each; total = 375 points), five (5) tests (120 points each; total = 600 points), and a Canvas exploration and communication exercise (25 points).

Grand total class points: 1000.

## **Books and Materials Required**

In order to keep the cost of books and materials to a minimum for my students, I have eschewed traditional textbooks and have selected the following as germane to this class. These are easily obtainable through Amazon or other online book retailers as well as through local booksellers using the ISBNs provided. The most expensive versions of the required textbooks in total should not exceed \$60 including sales tax. Buying used paperback or Kindle versions will lower the costs considerably. If you have a Kindle device or app, I highly recommend the Kindle versions, if available.
